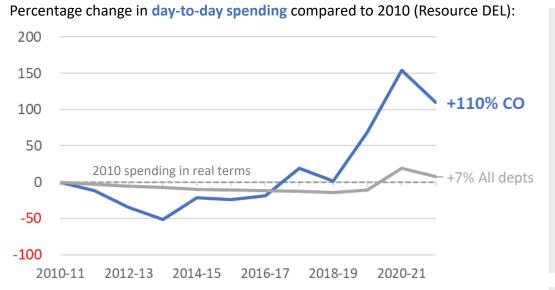

Day-to-day spending trends

- Day-to-day spending was cut after 2010-11 reaching its lowest level in 2013-14, but has since recovered.
- Total spending is set to be 110% higher in 2020-21 than in 2010-11, in real terms.
- £687 million was allocated for Covid-19 costs in 2020-21, £447 million of which was for the public information campaign and £101 million for ventilator procurement and design.
- This compares to £117.5 million allocated for Covid-19 costs in 2021-22, all of which is for the Covid-19 Public Information Campaign.

Investment spending trends

- Investment spending is prone to fluctuation depending on which projects the department is undertaking.
- In 2015-16 there was net Capital DEL income of £37 million due to the gain on the sale of the Admiralty Arch building.
- In 2021-22, total investment spending is set to be 298% higher than in 2010-11 in real terms.
- £184 million was allocated for Covid-19 costs in 2020-21, mainly for ventilator procurement and design (£163 million). This compares to nil allocated in 2021-22.

How is the Cabinet Office's day-to-day spending changing in 2021-22?

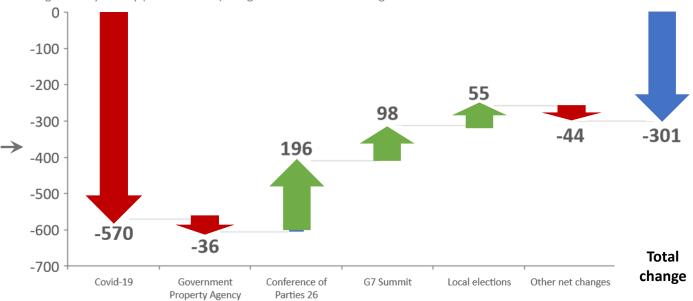

Changes in 2021-22

- Covid-19: £570 million decrease in Covid-19 costs, down from £674 million in 2020-21 to £117.5 million in 2021-22. All of the 2021-22 budget is for the Covid-19 Public Information Campaign.
- **Government Property Agency**: £35.9 million reduction in funding for the Government Property Agency due to the receipt of freehold rebate income.
- Conference of Parties 26: £195.5 million for the Conference of Parties (COP26) due to take place in November 2021. This was postponed from November 2020.
- G7 Summit: £97.7 million funding for the G7 Summit which took place in June 2021.
- Local elections: £55.4 million for local elections and the delayed Police Crime Commissioner elections.
- Other: this includes a £24 million and a £17 million decrease in the budgets for Grenfell Inquiry and the Infected Blood Inquiry, respectively. This is due to the timing of funding arrangements half of the expected funding is received at the Main Estimate and the remainder at the Supplementary Estimate.

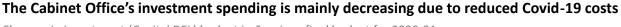

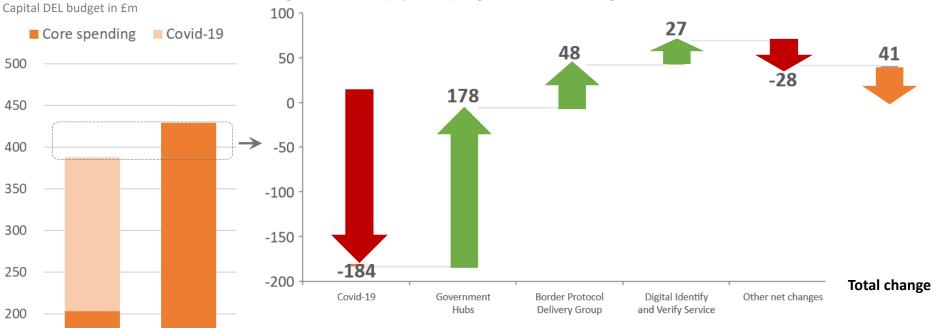

Changes in 2021-22

- Covid-19: £184 million decrease in Covid-19 costs, bringing the budget in 2021-22 to nil.
- Government Hubs: £178 million increase for the Government Hubs programme confirmed in the 2020 Spending Review, as part of the Levelling Up agenda.
- Border Protocol Delivery Group: £48 million increase for the Border Protocol Delivery Group, mostly relating to the Port Infrastructure Fund.
- Digital Identify and Verify Service: £27.3 million increase for the Digital Identify and Verify service, delivered by the Government Digital Service.
- Other: this includes a £12.5 million decrease relating to irrecoverable VAT in respect of the Public Sector Geospatial Agreement.

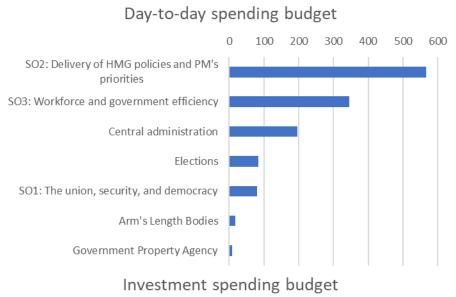

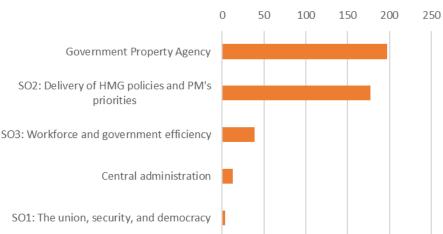

Most of the Cabinet Office's spending is on delivery of strategic objectives

Day-to-day spending (Resource DEL)

- The **Resource DEL** budget for the Cabinet Office in 2021-22 is **£1,300 million.**
- CO has allocated £992.8 million to deliver the department's
 Strategic Objectives. SO2 makes up the largest element in the dayto-day budget (£570 million), followed by SO3 (£345 million) and
 SO1 (£81 million).
- Central administration accounts for 15% (£196 million) of the total Resource DEL budget.
- Arm's Length Bodies make up 1.4% (£18.4 million) and the Government Property Agency 1% (£8.5 million).
- £84 million is allocated for elections.
- Covid-19 costs make up 9% (£117.5 million) of the day-to-day budget all of which was under the SO3 budget.

Investment spending (Capital DEL)

- The Capital DEL budget for the Cabinet Office in 2021-22 is £428.8 million.
- Of this, £219 million is for the delivery of Strategic Objectives: £177 million is for SO2, £38.7 million for SO£ and £3.2 million for SO1.
- A further £197 million is for the Government Property Agency.
- There is no budget allocated for Covid-19 costs in 2021-22, compared to £184 million in 2020-21.

Cabinet Office's spending beyond 2020-21

The most recent spending plans were published in **Spending Review 2020**, with some further announcements in **Budget 2021**. Due to uncertainty caused by Covid-19 plans were only given for 2021-22 and some specific multi-year capital programmes under the investment spending budget.

Major future commitments have included*:

- £228 million to support the government's Levelling Up agenda through investment in the Government Property Agency's hubs programme, relocating 22,000 civil service roles outside London by 2030.
- £97 million to support the government's ambition to modernise and reform the Civil Service.
- £4.7 million to establish a central capability to manage contingent liabilities.

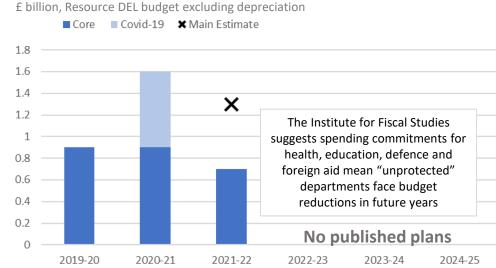
Day-to-day spending:

- The Main Estimate for 2021-22 is £0.6 billion higher than the Budget 2021 allocation.
- No Resource DEL budget has been allocated for Covid-19 costs beyond 2021-22.
- Cabinet Office's RDEL budgets are not allocated beyond 2021-22 and may be facing future spending reductions.

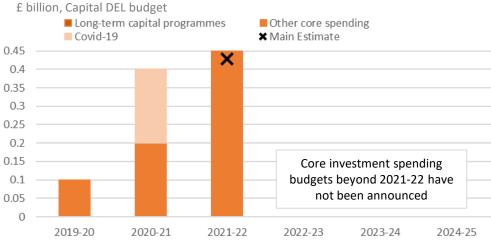
Investment spending:

- The Main Estimate for 2021-22 is £0.07 billion than the 2021 Budget allocation.
- There is currently no Capital DEL budget allocated for 2022-23 or beyond.
