


AN INTRODUCTION TO THE HOUSE OF LORDS

Both Houses of Parliament have met at Westminster since they first came into being in the 13th and 14th centuries. Westminster Hall dates from the end of the 11th century.

The rest of the old Parliamentary buildings were destroyed by fire in 1834 and the present Palace of Westminster was built between 1840 and 1860. The House of Lords first occupied its Chamber in 1847.

A competition was held for the design of the new building and the winner was the gothic design of Mr (later Sir) Charles Barry. The internal decoration and furniture are largely the work of Barry's assistant Augustus Pugin. A Royal Commission chaired by Prince Albert oversaw the commissioning of paintings and sculptures in most of the main rooms.

The House of Lords occupies the southern part of the Palace of Westminster. The House normally meets on around 150 days each year, sitting for about 1,000 hours in total. About half of the time of the House is spent discussing legislation.

The House also debates issues of public policy and scrutinises the Government through questions to ministers, of whom over 20 sit in the House of Lords. In addition to sittings in the Chamber, much work is

In addition there are 92 hereditary Peers and 26 Archbishops and Bishops of the Church of England.

The House has over 800 members. On average over 400 attend each daily sitting. Most members are Peers appointed for life.


THE CHOLMONDELEY ROOM AND TERRACE

The Cholmondeley Room adjoins the Terrace with its stunning views of the River Thames. The room came into operation in June 1963. It was given the name "Cholmondeley" after the 5th Marquess of Cholmondeley who, as Lord Great Chamberlain, recommended that Peers should have a room to entertain guests privately.

The Cholmondeley Room was originally three library stores with adjoining corridors. The Cholmondeley Room itself is used for pre-luncheon or dinner drinks.

The Terrace, located right on the north bank of the River Thames, can seat between 50 to 120 guests comfortably for sit-down lunches and dinners. Alternatively the Terrace can be used for receptions and cocktail parties. It can be prepared to accommodate between 100 and 250 guests. The east front of the Palace is 265.7m (872ft) from end to end and is the longest façade of any building in London and the River Terrace itself is 206.6m (678ft) long. The coats of arms of the sovereigns from William the Conqueror to Queen Victoria are displayed in carved stone at principal floor level. By 1900 the Terrace was popular for Members to take ladies out for tea and has since been developed for full dining.

The wallpaper was designed by Augustus Welby Pugin who collaborated with Charles Barry to produce Gothic Revival designs throughout the building. The letter 'R' and the chained White Hart or deer were the symbols of King Richard II who commissioned the great hammer-beam roof in Westminster Hall.


THE ATTLEE ROOM



The Attlee Room is named after Clement Attlee, 1st Earl Attlee who was Labour Prime Minister at the beginning of the 'Atomic Age' from 1945 to 1951. His Government was responsible for nationalising key industries and establishing the Welfare State.

The Attlee Room overlooks the River Thames and Black Rod's Garden with furniture commissioned from the Viscount Linley.

The Attlee Room is a delightful place for lunches, afternoon teas and dinners. There is seating for 16 to 38 people (30 to 60 standing) in comfortable surroundings in this elegant and gracious room.

THE HOME ROOM

The Home Room overlooks the River Thames to the East and the Terrace to the North. The room is named after Alec Douglas-Home (1903-1995), Baron Home of the Hirsel who was Prime Minister from October 1963 to October 1964 following the resignation of Harold Macmillan. The furniture was ommissioned from the designer David Armstrong-Jones (Viscount Linley, son of the late Princess Margaret).

The Home Room can comfortably accommodate guests for lunches, afternoon teas and dinners with seating for 12-20 people (20-40 standing). During favorable summer months the adjourning Terrace can accommodate guests for pre-luncheon and dinner drinks.



The Houses of Parliament are located in the heart of Westminster in the centre of London (postcode SWIA 0AA), and are well served by all forms of public transport.

Arriving by rail The nearest stations are Charing Cross, Waterloo and Victoria (15-20 minutes walk). Arriving by underground Westminster Station (Circle, District and Jubilee lines).

Arriving by bus 3, 11, 12, 24, 53, 87,88, 148, 159, 211, 453, N2, N11, N87, N136, N155, N159 and N381 all stop nearby.
