



## Conservative hereditary peers' by-election – revised arrangements

### Notice to electors

Following the retirement of Lord Brabazon of Tara on 28 April 2022, a notice was sent to all those on the register of hereditary peers inviting them to state whether they wished to be a candidate in the resulting by-election. The deadline for notifying candidacies was 7 June 2022.

The death of Lord Swinfen on 5 June 2022 resulted in a further vacancy among the hereditary peers elected by the Conservative hereditary peers who sit in the House of Lords. **These two vacancies will be filled by holding one by-election under Standing Order 9, the timetable for which has been extended as described below.**

Those eligible to stand are all hereditary peers whose names are on the register of hereditary peers wishing to stand for election as members of the House of Lords, maintained by the Clerk of the Parliaments. All those on this register are asked to indicate by 5pm on Tuesday 21 June whether they wish to be a candidate in the by-election to replace Lord Brabazon of Tara and Lord Swinfen. A notice of candidates and statements will be sent out on Friday 24 June.

Lord Brabazon of Tara and Lord Swinfen were two of 42 hereditary peers elected by the Conservative hereditary peers. Under Standing Order 9 (2), the voters in this by-election will be the excepted hereditary peers belonging to the Conservative group,<sup>1</sup> of whom there are currently 45 eligible to vote.<sup>2</sup> A list is in Annex 1.

### Timetable and conduct of the by-election

Candidates will be invited, but not required, to submit statements in support of their candidature. Such statements will be circulated by the House administration to all electors. Statements must not exceed 75 words.

The Code of Conduct for the by-election is in Annex 2. Civica Election Services are assisting the Clerk of the Parliaments with organising the by-election.

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<sup>1</sup> All peers in this group who have taken the oath on or before 29 June are eligible to vote, except those who are: subject to statutory disqualification; suspended from the service of the House; or on leave of absence.

<sup>2</sup> This figure comprises 36 hereditary peers elected by Conservative hereditary peers who currently are in the Conservative group; and nine hereditary peers elected by the whole House who currently are in the Conservative group.

*The timetable for the by-election is:*

Tuesday 21 June, 5pm	Deadline for candidate registration and deadline for members to register for a postal vote (only members with accessibility requirements or members without a parliamentary email address may request a postal vote).
Friday 24 June	Ballot papers sent by Civica Election Services to those requesting a postal vote.
Friday 24 June	List of candidates and statements issued to electors.
Tuesday 5 July	Voting to take place electronically from 10am until 5pm on Tuesday 5 July. 5pm on 5 July is also the deadline for receipt of postal ballot papers.
Wednesday 6 July	Result of the by-election reported to the House.

Voting will be conducted by secret ballot. One election, with one ballot paper, will be held to elect two hereditary peers. The Single Transferable Vote system will be used. Voters will place the name of the candidate they most strongly support at the top of the digital ballot paper, then place their next most favoured candidate below, and so on. Voters may cast as many or as few votes as they wish. In order to be elected, the successful candidate must receive at least as many votes as all the other candidates put together. In the event of this not happening after first preference votes have been allocated, the votes of the candidates receiving the lowest number of first preference votes will be shared out according to the second preference marked on them. This will be repeated until one candidate has at least half of the total valid votes.

Once the first candidate has been elected all ballot papers are re-counted to elect the second candidate. In this second count all preferences for the already-elected candidate are transferred to the next preference on the ballot paper. Even though two candidates are being elected, the ballot paper should be marked with only one "1", one "2", etc.

The results of the by-election will be announced in the House of Lords Chamber by the Clerk of the Parliaments at a convenient moment (likely to be after oral questions) on Wednesday 6 July.

The full result, including the number of first preference votes cast for each candidate and the position after each transfer of votes, will be available in the Printed Paper Office soon after the announcement by the Clerk of the Parliaments. The result will also be published online.

## **Postal ballots**

Members who have accessibility needs which mean they cannot use the online voting system or who do not have a parliamentary email address may request a postal vote. Such requests for postal votes must be received by 5pm on Tuesday 21 June by returning the form below. Members should specify the address to which the ballot paper should be posted. Ballot papers will be posted on Friday 24 June. The ballot papers for postal votes will be sent by Civica Election Services. The ballot papers must be returned by post to Civica Election Services (a prepaid addressed envelope will be provided). Postal votes must be returned to Civica Election Services by 5pm on Tuesday 5 July. Postal ballot papers arriving after the deadline will not be counted.

## **Data sharing**

Electors should note that their name, parliamentary email address and, if they wish to request a postal ballot, their postal address will be shared with Civica Election Services for the purposes of the administration of the by-election. The lawful basis for processing this information is Article 6(1)(e) of the UK General Data Protection Regulation, as supplemented by the Data Protection Act 2018.

## **Annex 2: Code of Conduct**

1. Ballot papers will not indicate any qualification or reason why a candidate should be elected.
2. Candidates may not offer hospitality, entertainment or financial inducements to electors intended to influence their votes or likely to have that effect.
3. Candidates may not engage in any activity intended or likely to discredit other candidates in the by-election.
4. Candidates may not solicit votes near the room where the by-election is taking place.
5. If the Clerk of the Parliaments suspects, on reasonable grounds, that some material irregularity or improper conduct may have occurred in the electoral process, he may refer the matter to the Committee for Privileges and Conduct. The Committee may, if it thinks fit, recommend the disqualification of a successful candidate if their election appears to have been influenced by material irregularity or improper conduct.
6. In this code of conduct, “candidate” includes an agent or supporter acting on behalf of the candidate.
